Resolution adopted during the 341st plenary meeting on 20 September 1991

IRAQ'S NON-COMPLIANCE WITH ITS SAFEGUARDS OBLIGATIONS

The General Conference,

- (a) Noting United Nations Security Council Resolutions 687 and 707,
 - (b) Deploing Iraq's non-compliance with its safeguards obligations with the IAEA and violation of its obligations under the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and Security Council Resolution 687,
 - (c) Recalling with approval the statements and actions of the Director General and the Board of Governors concerning Iraq's non-compliance with its nuclear non-proliferation obligations, including the Board resolution of 18 July 1991 and the report by the Board to the General Conference dated 13 September 1991, and
 - (d) Deeply concerned by continuing Iraqi efforts to obstruct implementation of Security Council Resolutions 687 and 707,
1. Supports the above mentioned actions taken by the Board of Governors;
 2. Strongly condemns Iraq's non-compliance with its nuclear non-proliferation obligations, including its safeguards agreements with the IAEA;

3. Demands that Iraq immediately and fully comply with all of its nuclear non-proliferation obligations;
4. Commends the Director General and his staff for their strenuous efforts in the implementation of Security Council Resolutions 687 and 707, in particular the detection and destruction or otherwise rendering inoffensive equipment and material which could be used for nuclear weapons; and
5. Requests the Director General to report the views of the General Conference to the Secretary General, and to report to the Board of Governors and to the thirty-sixth General Conference on his efforts to implement Security Council Resolutions 687 and 707, and decides to remain seized of this issue.
